The Creative Coalition is an organization consisting of actors and others associated with the entertainment industry whose purpose is to address social issues as well as assure tuition of the arts is provided by public education.

"I think that any time an organization that is formed by individuals who have a shared interest that benefits kids is a fantastic thing that they are doing for local communities, their state as well as nationally." Escalante said.

The Sundance Film Festival is an annual film festival held in Park City, Utah where independent filmmakers showcase their movies and projects. The 2017 Sundance Film Festival took place from January 19th through the 29th and displayed independent films such as 'Strong Island', 'Motherland' and 'The Yellow Birds'.
